PURPOSE AND OUTCOME

Course Overview

This course addresses the influence of occupation-based practice on health and well-being for adults and older adults with impairments that impact participation. Students will learn to facilitate performance of clients to improve health in natural environments, such as homes, communities and workplaces.

Relation to Program Outcomes

This course is situated in the fall semester, second year of the Doctor of Occupational Therapy program. During this semester, the specific application of previously acquired knowledge to more complex activities and issues of participation in adults and seniors is emphasized. Students develop theoretically sound, evidence- and occupation-based interventions grounded upon the analysis and application of clinical competences in the core knowledge of occupational therapy. Classroom and laboratory activities are used to develop and evaluate individual student competencies. The focus is on instructional outcomes (Phase 1) related to the following curricular themes: human occupation and health, critical thinking for practice and scholarship, psychomotor skills, collaborative practice, and professionalism.

Exam Policy

Two multiple choice exams are given (Exam 1 and Exam 2) in this course. The exams will use Lockdown browser.

Multiple choice exams are used to assess critical thinking in relation to knowledge and skills taught in the course and are provided in the style used on the NBCOT Certification Exam (e.g., there may be more than one “right” answer, but the student must identify the “best” answer). Students who need accommodations for in-class exams must contact the Disability Resource Center and make arrangements prior to the exam.

Make up Exams or Other Work

Recording Lectures
